2019 Ozaukee Master Gardener Annual Report

2019, In ninety-seven Master Gardeners volunteered a total of 6,198 hours across Ozaukee County and completed 1,627 hours of continuing education to ensure they are up to date on the latest science-based horticultural information. Gardeners also reported making 10,400 educational contacts with community members at their various project sites. Ozaukee County volunteer projects include Webster School garden and green team, Pioneer Village, Tendick Park, Kuhefuss House, Advocates Shelter, Yard and Garden Help Line, Heirloom and Herb Plant Sale, Lasata Care Center,

County Community Gardens, and the 4-H Horticulture Project.

This year the Advocates project is highlighted. According to the project chair, "Advocates of Ozaukee provides a shelter for victims of abuse. Ozaukee Master Gardener volunteers plant and maintain numerous gardens at the shelter in support of the healing process for abuse survivors and at the same time create a calm setting for staff. A colorful, textured herb walkway leads clients to their new, temporary home. Master gardener volunteers maintain this welcoming entry during the spring, summer, and fall. We also take responsibility for several other gardens on the property.

4-H Youth Development

During the month of November 589 Ozaukee County 4-H members self-selected and registered for over 105 different types of projects averaging 3.6 projects per youth for a total of 2139 projects. Each project belongs to one of the following eight subject areas; Creative Arts, STEM, Business & Citizenship, Environment & Outdoors, Plan & Animal Sciences, Cloverbud Activities, Food & Healthy Living and Practical Learning. The projects with the greatest number of enrollment are Photography (142) Archery (100), Drawing and Painting (88) Cloverbuds (87), and Art (83).

4-H projects are based on the general idea that young people learn best when they choose hands-on learning experiences that are guided by adults who understand and care about them. 4-H projects use a "learn-by-doing" approach, based in the assumption that strong and lasting learning happens when you do something, reflect upon what you do, and then apply what you've learned to your next effort. 4-H activities are led by 4-H volunteer leaders who create learning partnerships with youth, guided by basic principles of youth development.

This year 236 adults and 140 Youth registered as volunteers and make 4-H possible across the 12 community clubs and 24 county wide projects. Volunteers build the capacity and extend the reach of the Extension programs and in return we provide them with positive youth development knowledge and skills needed to effectively work with youth. The statewide Fall Forum, held each November, provides educational opportunities for youth and adult leaders. Ozaukee County 4-H program was represented by 5 adult and 6 youth leaders at the conference. At the county level, Jayna Hintz, the 4-H Program Coordinator continues to provide Volunteer in Preparation

Trainings both as monthly scheduled classes and by appointment to meet the needs of the volunteers.
