4-H Youth Development







- A series of virtual trainings for youth and adult 4-H volunteers. Where volunteers learned their roles and responsibilities. The goal is to prepare volunteers to lead quality youth development programs.
- A project lesson led virtually where youth and adults learned monotype-printing processes. The goal of this effort was for youth to learn a new skill and to model how to host a virtual project meeting while engaging youth in a hands-on activity.
- Facilitated identifying new leadership for a community 4-H club. The goal of this effort was to ensure the continuation of high-quality leadership and engagement in the club, after current leadership transitioned out due to a move.
- Led the coordination of an effort to increase accessibility of a county building that was not wheelchair accessible, based on these efforts youth can fully participate in a 4-H project.
- A Tri-County 4-H Virtual Visual Arts Festival promoted to all school and youth community groups. This effort facilitated one-on-one critique sessions for youth, to receive feedback on their artwork entered. Providing youth, a place to reflect on what they learned and can apply to future experiences.
- 4-H Youth state virtual exchange meeting where participants engage with youth from different counties in Wisconsin and Kansas. The goal of this effort is to increase youth's connection to 4-H, strengthen their leadership skills, build new friendships, and gain new knowledge.

Supporting Agriculture Professionals





- A one-day virtual conference for farmers, managers, agronomists, engineers, government agency personnel, and agribusiness professionals where they learned innovation, research, and solutions for manure handling and storage to optimize manure management, upgrade biogas production, as well as effectively manage manurederived nutrients and odor and gas emissions.
- A YouTube livestream for farmers and ag professionals where they learned about building a positive farm business culture with employee safety. This effort is designed to increase their awareness of the value of a positive workplace culture for their farm business and to improve an employee's work experience.
- Development of an article on common strategies to consider for fair versus equal inheritance during the farm succession process for farmers and agribusiness professionals. This effort was designed to increase the awareness of available farm inheritance distribution tools and strategies.
- A webinar for farmers and ag professionals where they learned about getting started in a farm/food-related business in order to increase their awareness of how to start a business and to provide access to support resources.
- A virtual program for home gardeners, where they learned how to care for tropical plants in order to be able to successfully grow them in Wisconsin's climate.

Ozaukee Law Enforcement Address Citizen Questions on Race and Biases

- A series of virtual conversations for community members ("Ozaukee County Talks About Race"), co-facilitated by local partner Bridge the Divide, where attendees participated in book reads with area libraries and engaged in small group conversations. This effort was designed to increase racial literacy, deepen understanding of how history impacts racial inequities, contribute to meaningful conversations, and develop ideas for personal action.
- A virtual program for community members, where they submit questions regarding racism and biases to a panel of local law enforcement officials. This effort was designed to increase understanding and awareness of Ozaukee law enforcement, provide an opportunity to engage and connect, and increase participants' level of comfort engaging with law enforcement.
- Development of a peer learning program for nonprofit leaders where they develop skills to support their organization and build relationships that improve the capacity of local nonprofits to address complex community issues.
