Agriculture Highlights

- Crops: Liz Gartman, Crops Educator
 - Quality forage production is the cornerstone of dairy cattle feeding programs. As the dairy industry is a key economic driver in Wisconsin, it is necessary to provide research driven recommendations to forage producers as they manage cropping decisions. Extension has a robust level of expertise in the forage production space, however many client facing publications have not been updated as specialists and educators have retired or moved on. As new staff join the Extension team, refreshing this forage production resource became a priority to ensure the most relevant information is available to forage producers. A team of Extension educators and specialists in the crops, dairy and livestock programs have catalogued and are assessing the priority and importance of each resource posted on the previous website, and are strategically moving content forward and refreshing content where more relevant work has been done. This provides forage producers with reliable information and research that allows them to make the best decisions for their operations.
 - Planning for a series of listening sessions for dairy producers and nutritionists where we will engage attendees to share their input related to custom dairy heifer grazing in Wisconsin. This activity is designed to determine what barriers to implementation exist when integrating more dairy heifers into perennial landscape grazing systems so we can develop future programs to support producers in these systems.
 - Planning for a Regional Ag Day program for farmers, agronomists, nutritionists and other agriculture professionals in collaboration with the Cedar Creek Farmers in Washington county. The goal is to provide timely livestock, dairy and crop production and marketing updates to producers so they can make informed animal and crop management decisions in 2024.
